

SECURING INCOME FOR MARGINALISED SMALL FARMERS AND DISABLED PEOPLE THROUGH INTEGRATED ORGANIC FARMING METHODS



Project

In this phase of the project, the **Sebeta Biofarm** will be expanded with additional components such as a biogas facility. Employees of local partner organisations are trained to operate the biofarm and to become **agriculturally and financially more productive in a sustainable way**.

The Sebeta Biofarm will be expanded as a training and **model farm for neighbouring farmers** and also countrywide for disabled people in a rural context. The participants also receive material input, which, alongside expert supervision ensures that **knowledge learned** can be **applied on the farms** and passed on to neighbouring farmers.

Alongside practical work and theoretical teaching in organic farming, the participants are also taught **life skills**. Important topics in particular are HIV/Aids, family planning and awareness creation to prevent sexual exploitation of disabled women.

Relevance

In an initial phase of the project, a model farm as an organic farming school was established in conjunction with the Development Organisation for People with Disabilities (DOPD) on a plot belonging to the Sebeta School for the Blind. Visually impaired children and teaching personnel were trained in organic farming methods and were able to apply their new knowledge on their own farms and gardens. The produce was used by the school kitchen, while sale of the excess at the local market provided a welcome profit.

Disadvantaged people with disabilities and poor small-scale farmers are acquiring new prospects thanks to the integrated approach of the organic farm and agricultural school and its adapted, **practice-oriented teaching**. The opportunity to independently improve one's own financial situation is a first decisive step in social integration.

Beneficiaries

1500 people (of those at least 500 are women), who are trained in sustainable agricultural methods profit directly from the project. Additionally, 100 disabled people (40 young women, 60 young men) profit from income-generating activities. This includes blind, deaf and physically challenged people.

Goals

1. To strengthen the **Sebeta model biofarm** as a demonstration farm for organic agriculture and to give disabled people an opportunity to generate their own income
2. 1500 small-scale farmers and 100 people with disabilities receive **training in sustainable farming methods**
3. **Dissemination** of the model-concept of the organic farm and establishment of other model farms in the region
4. Expansion of the organic farm with additional **biofarm components and material** (greenhouse, biogas facility etc.)
